Executive Reports

The President

The year started early with the annual Programme Committee Meeting even before I had a chance to take the helm from Heather Hamilton. Heather was a tough act to follow and served MLUWC most ably!

The 2010 CFUW Annual General Meeting was held in Ottawa in July, followed by the IFUW triennium meeting in Mexico City in August. I had the double pleasure of representing MLUWC at the meeting as well as finishing my term as Vice-president CFUW for the Quebec region. Celine Dupuis, VP CFUW for MLUWC, also attended part of the meeting and participated in the resolutions process. The AGM was again a stimulating experience, offering the chance to meet members from across the country and exchange ideas. The UN announced in the summer that there would be an agency focusing on women's issues to be named *UN Women*. The long-time CFUW Executive Director, Susan Russell, retired. The focus of the 2010 AGM was on Afghanistan, in particular, on security, diplomacy and development. Along with some highly reputable panelists, we also heard from Alaina Podmorrow, a young girl who believes that 'education is the most powerful tool for achieving peace', and we established an organization called *Canadian Little Women for Little Women in Afghanistan*.

In the early fall, we revised the MLUWC Constitution and By-laws to clarify and simplify some of the operations. We managed the process early in the year to ensure that the MLUWC directory would have the current version of the Constitution and By-laws and thus avoid any confusion. The Past President was assigned the responsibility of overseeing such amendments in the future.

The CFUW Constitution and By-laws were also redrafted in their entirety and circulated to all Clubs across the country for feedback. MLUWC sent in a three-page list of comments after consultation with the executive and the membership, and was the only Club from the Quebec region to send in comments. Many of these comments were addressed in the revised draft to be considered for voting at the AGM in Newfoundland this August. A subsequent list of comments on the revised draft will be sent to CFUW shortly.

Driven by a lack of enthusiasm for leadership positions and for resolutions, we established a Strategic Planning Committee to determine the current motivation and interest of members so that we could determine a possible new direction for MLUWC that better responds to the needs of the membership. I chair this committee and along with the other committee members we designed a survey to identify strategies for the future of MLUWC.

Though the year started without two Committee Chairs, we were fortunate to have both Ginger Brossard and Marjorie Hamilton Harding join the team in the fall as Fundraising Chair and Interest Groups Chair, respectively. We were very grateful to have Carol Ohlin step in as Recording Secretary for the second part of 2010–2011. She substituted for Eileen Preston, who has had some health issues.

We considered two CFUW resolutions being proposed this year for voting at the AGM in August. The membership approved the resolution on *Idling of Motor Vehicles*, but rejected *Criminalization of Non-State Actor Torture* as written on the basis that it required some clarification. Four MLUWC members will attend the 2011 AGM in Newfoundland: Connie Ellis, Gilda Martinello, Patricia DuVal and myself.

There has been a considered focus on publicity this year, in addition to regular announcements of our general meetings by Eva Weiss in newspapers, and on radio and TV. At the December General Meeting, MLUWC donated the proceeds from the raffle to the West Island Cancer Wellness Centre. Janet Ankcorn used this as an opportunity to put a write-up in *The Suburban* and *The Gazette*. More recently, I was interviewed along with Marilyn Flaherty and a couple of other members, and an article was published in the new *Femmes d'ici* section of *The Chronicle*, along with a photograph of our Fundraising Chair, Ginger Brossard. We have sent AGM invitations to leaders of other like-minded organizations in an effort to further broaden our visibility. In May, Gilda Martinello will organize a table showcasing what MLUWC offers at the *Savvy Seniors Fair* being held at the Red Barn in Baie d'Urfé. Any further suggestions for publicity will be very welcome as we strive to increase the visibility of MLUWC in the community.

On the advocacy front, I made a presentation to the Parliamentary Committee on Palliative and Compassionate Care on behalf of MLUWC in December 2010. Marjorie Hamilton Harding, Anna Wilkins and Connie Ellis helped prepare the brief for the presentation.

The Quebec Provincial Council meeting was held on April 30, 2011 and hosted by UWC Montreal Inc. The meeting focused on the organization of a *Strategic Planning Session* presented by Johanne Desrochers and the information promises to be very helpful as we go forward with our own strategic planning process. UWC Montreal Inc. also discussed the future direction of its *Financial Literacy* project and will present a workshop at the CFUW AGM. Dorys Makhoul of the Montreal Women's Centre spoke about the *Situation of Women in Montreal* and shared some startling statistics about how far women still have to go to achieve equality. The Club reports and discussions between members were very enlightening.

This has been a good year for MLUWC: attendance at both general and executive meetings was good, members showcased their interests once again at Members' Night, there were two successful fundraising events and reasonable participation in the Strategic Planning Survey, with 88 members responding. Thank you to all the members, interest group leaders, committee chairs and executive for making this another successful year for MLUWC!

Fundraising

Our first Fundraising activity of the year was Theatre Night. The Lakeshore Players Inc. provided us with a Benefit Performance on Tuesday, November 9, 2010 at 8:00 pm. The ticket price was \$24.00. The gross proceeds collected were \$4,967.00. From this, a sum of \$600.00 was payable to the Lakeshore Players Inc to cover the cost of royalties, the printing of the programs and the rental of the theatre. The net proceeds for the Scholarship Fund came to \$4367.00.

Incidentally, we sold 203 tickets. Normally we should have paid the Lakeshore Players Inc. \$9.00 for the three extra tickets but the Business Manager, Guy Vézina, waived this amount. We thanked him warmly.

The play was a great success: *Steel Magnolias* by Robert Harling took us to the deep South for a while and the story had a final message: the need for good friends to help us through the bad times and rejoice with us during the good times! How true!

Connie Ellis provided us with an innovation: two door prizes—one from Westspa.ca in Dollard-des-Ormeaux for a manicure, and the second, a gift certificate in the amount of \$100.00 toward a meal for two people at the restaurant Le Gourmand in Pointe Claire.

I wish to thank you all for your participation in the success of the soirée, and particularly, the ladies that helped distribute the program, collect tickets at the door and for the draw of the door prizes.

Our second Fundraising activity was the Games Day Luncheon at the Lawn Bowling Annex in Beaconsfield between noon and 4:00 pm on Thursday, May 5. The tickets were kept at \$12.00, and 93 were sold. We had a lovely turnout and many players had a chance to play their favourite game, whether bridge, mahjong or scrabble, with friends

after a nice luncheon prepared by the ladies. Door prizes were raffled, and a half and half draw was held plus tombola. Many ladies went home with a lovely prize.

This year we had a very generous donation by Marjorie Hamilton-Harding and her husband of a Quebec-made replica of the Bluenose, the Canadian sailing ship represented on the back of our dime. This was raffled all on its own as it was considered an heirloom. We were fortunate in receiving donations in the amount of \$160.00 in lieu of tickets from ladies who could not be present. The ticket sales and the various raffles yielded a gross revenue of \$1,984.50. The expenses and the rental of the Annex totaled \$285.31. Therefore, including the donation, our net proceeds for the Games Day were \$1,859.19.

Thank you again to all who participated in the success of these activities. All proceeds were the benefit of the MLUWC Scholarship Fund.

Montreal Council of Women

General Council meetings of the Montreal Council of Women are held monthly on the second Thursday of every month at Les Jardins du Canal, 2700 Rufus Rockhead in Montreal. These monthly MCW Luncheons (\$8.00), usually hosted by a federated member organization, are held at 12:00 noon, followed by an afternoon program of interesting and inspiring guest speakers. As well, each hostess group has an opportunity to present and introduce their organization to those in attendance.

The highlight of the year was the celebration of the Montreal Council of Women's 24th Woman of the Year Gala on December 3 at the Mount Stephen Club. Together with Chitra Chopra, Heather Hamilton and Connie Ellis, five of us represented MLUWC.

The program themes presented this past year were as follows:

September 2010 – Transport 2000 Quebec is an association, non-profit and non-government, dedicated to the defence of public transit users and the promotion of efficient and sustainable means of transportation. Mr. Smereka and Judith Racine, the guest speakers, shared with MCW their vision of public transport in Quebec as well as recommendations to improve transportation throughout the province.

October 2010 – Women's History Month celebrated Canadian women of colour who have marked the history of our country. MCW members had the privilege of hearing Helene Wavroch of the Coloured Women's Club of Montreal. She presented an extremely interesting slide show based on the significant contribution of Black women to the early and present history of Canada. MCW also paid tribute to the women who have been awarded the Governor General's "Person Award". Several recipients of the award gave speeches that related to their award.

November 2010 – Seniors were the focus when representatives from the NDG Senior Citizen Council addressed seniors' concerns, issues and programs.

December 2010 – A gala luncheon recognized the Honourable Eleni Bakopanos as the winner of the 2010 Woman of the Year Award. The first Greek-born woman to be elected to Parliament and presently the Senior Director for Government Relations for McGill University, Ms Bakopanos was honoured for excellence and achievement in Public Service.

January 2011 – Three representatives of the South Asian Women's Cultural Community (SAWCC) spoke of real-life experiences women face when immigrating to Canada and the programs established by the community centre to meet their needs.

February 2011 – Two people representing the Multi-Ethnic Association for the Integration of Persons with Disabilities spoke about the specialized integrated day care programs and compounded difficulties that parents and their disabled and/or disadvantaged children encounter, especially as newly arrived immigrants.

March 2011 - Mr. Alan DeSousa, member of the Executive Council of the City of Montreal, gave an interesting presentation on the Montreal Community Sustainable Development Plan and the City's direction and plans for the next five years. Environmental issues are of major concern and further measures are recommended.

April 2011 – Guest speakers Ginette Sheehy, Director General of John Abbott College, and Nakuset, Director of The Native Women's Shelter, reflected on their professional careers and their personal journeys of "40 Years Later, the Lady in the Driver's Seat".

Upcoming MCW Special Event: A *Canadian Citizenship Ceremony* will be hosted by the Montreal Council of Women on Thursday, May 5 at 10:30 am. at the Office of Canadian Citizenship and Immigration, 1025 St. Jacques West, near Peel Street (ground floor) During the ceremony, the new citizen receives a Certificate of Canadian Citizenship.

The MCW Annual General Meeting takes place on June 2.

The Montreal Council of Women publishes a monthly BULLETIN and its website www.mcw-cfm.org plays an important role as a voice for women in Montreal and surrounding areas through a forum of more than seventy member organizations and more than seventy individuals.

Art Appreciation

Here is a summary of the principal activities that were carried out by the Art Appreciation Group this year:

In September, we toured *The European Collection* of the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts. The main objective was to learn how to look at a painting. It was meant as a comprehensive introduction to European art, from early Renaissance paintings in Italy and Spain through the evolution of art up to the Impressionist period.

In February we returned to the MMFA for the much anticipated exhibition *The Warrior Emperor and China's Terracotta Army*. With a guided tour we saw a unique selection of some 300 artifacts, including the famous life-size terracotta soldiers of the first Qin Emperor's army. It took us back through 1,000 years of Chinese art and history. In preparation for this exhibition, some members attended a lecture by Chen Shen, guest curator of the exhibition, followed by a film "The secrets of the First Emperor of China".

In March, eight members took part in a two-day trip to Quebec City to visit the Musée National des Beaux-Arts du Québec to follow the aesthetic path of Marc-Aurèle Fortin (1888-1970). We marvelled at the charm of his urban views of Montreal, Île d'Orléans and the Charlevoix, Gaspé and Saguenay regions. This was followed by a delicious dinner at The Continental and gallery visits the following day.

In June, we will have our last activity for this year. It will take place at the National Gallery in Ottawa to see *Caravaggio and His Followers in Rome*, a major international exhibition of approximately 60 works that will bring the genius of Caravaggio to Canada for the first time and mark the 400th anniversary of his death. Showing exclusively in Canada at the National Gallery, this ambitious exhibition will focus on the period he spent in Rome. It will offer a rare opportunity to explore his unique style, provocative character and his profound influence on some of the most significant European artists of the Baroque period, including Simon Vouet, Peter Paul Rubens and Orazio Gentileschi.

We began the year by reviewing *To Kill a Mocking Bird* by Harper Lee. This classic is celebrating its 50th anniversary in print. Coupled with this reading we also reviewed *The Book Of Negroes* by Lawrence Hill. Book Club II

This year the following titles were selected for discussion:

- *Wolf Hall* by Hilary Mantel, a tale of intrigue in the court of King Henry VIII, a vividly told Tudor story which won the Man Booker Prize, one of the most prestigious prizes in English literature.

-*Elegance of the Hedgehog* by Muriel Barbery, which Le Figaro described as 'the publishing phenomenon of the decade'. It was even compared to Proust and it sold more than a million copies in France last year and has won numerous awards; a story of social class, relationships and the passion for reading.

-*Britannia's Daughters* by Joanna Trollope examines the contribution of women in building and sustaining the British Empire, their social categorizations and the power that war allowed them to take.

-*The Heart Specialist* by Clare Rotham Holden was of particular interest to us since the action takes place in Montreal and because we were able to attend a lecture given by the author on her experience of writing this moving story of a fighter, a woman who had to carve out her place in the chauvinistic medical milieu in order to achieve her dream of becoming a doctor.

-*The Golden Mean* by Annabel Lyon, her first novel, re-imagines the real-life teacher/student relationship between Aristotle and a 13 year-old boy who would soon transform the world as Alexander the Great.

-*A Bed of Red Flowers* by Nelofer Pazira takes us from the democratic agitation of the 1960s, through the Soviet-sponsored upheavals of the 1970s and 1980s, to the rise of the mujahidin and Taliban, and, finally, to the American-sponsored overthrow of the Afghan regime in 2001. We were privileged to have the insight of the Kandahar-based commander on this terrible situation through the reviewer of the book, his mother.

-*A History of Marriage* by Elizabeth Abbott. This book is a kaleidoscope of entertaining facts and vignettes about marriages past and present.

-Art books are being presented in April by members who wish to share their discoveries and tell us why they recommend their findings.

-*Champlain's Dream* by David H. Fisher is May's selection, a challenge of a book which is the definitive biography of Samuel de Champlain (1567–1635): spy, explorer, courtier, soldier, sailor, ethnologist, mapmaker, and founder and governor of New France (today's Quebec), which he founded in 1608. We are privileged to have a history teacher as a reviewer.

-*Paradise of the Blind*, by Duong Thu Huong, with its insight into Vietnam, will close our season. This staunchly unsentimental, evocative novel offers a narrative rich in detail and free of cliché, a depiction of the complexity of Vietnamese culture.

Most of us appreciated the variety of themes and literary styles of the books chosen for discussion this year and hope for just such a rich and captivating selection next year, which will be determined in the coming weeks.

Music History

The sessions were well attended and we had some lively discussions. Many thanks to my two assistants, Suzanne and Joanne, and to all the ladies who brought refreshments.
