letsénhaienhs Tonya Perron is a Kanienkehakeh of Kahnawà:ke serving her second term as an elected Chief on the Mohawk Council of Kahnawake. Prior to her election to the Council in 2018, she was a criminal defense attorney in private practice representing Indigenous people before the courts (1997-2018). She is an alumnus of the McGill Faculty of Law (1995) holding both a Bachelor of Civil Law (B.C.L.) and a Bachelor of Common Law (L.L.B.).

letsénhaienhs Perron is the lead portfolio chief responsible for both the justice and legislation portfolios, as well as the cannabis file. She is also a chief on the governance, administrative affairs and regulatory boards and commissions portfolios. Following her re-election in 2020, the Ratitsénhaienhs (Council of Chiefs) appointed her as the Assistant to the Ohén:ton Í:rate/Í:iente ne Ratitsénhaienhs (Grand Chief).

DUES INCREASE

At the last Executive meeting the following resolution was passed unanimously:

“Effective with the 2023-2024 year, the MLUWC membership dues will increase by \$10 to \$130.”

Our Club expenses have stayed relatively stable but what we pay to CFUW (and through them to GWI) has increased. This has been happening for several years now and as a result, our once-healthy bank balance has gone down significantly.

We have not raised fees for about 10 years and would not be doing our due diligence if we did not raise them this year. If we do not raise fees, in two years our bank balance will be completely wiped out.

This item was discussed at the April meeting. It will be on the agenda at the AGM in May (with no discussion) but you will be asked to vote on the increase.

Let's Talk About Money!

The proposition to increase dues has prompted a lot of discussion about money. Members of the Executive have received emails suggesting we dip into the “tens of thousands of dollars we have set aside” rather than raising dues. As a result, I came to the realization that many of our members may not have a clear grasp of our finances.

So, as out-going President, I felt it important to clearly explain our financial situation, so that you can make an informed decision when you vote on the dues increase at the Annual General Meeting.

The MLUCW has two financial entities that are completely **separate** - the Club itself, and the Scholarship Fund. We also have two Treasurers to take care of these two entities. Jane Hamilton Weber takes care of our Club finances and Susan Pick oversees the cash and investment accounts of the Scholarship Fund.



Scholarship Fund

Yes, it is true, the Scholarship Fund does have “tens of thousands of dollars”. In fact, the current balance of our investment account is **\$210,306.80** and we have **\$21,405.28** in cash in the bank for a total of **\$231,712.08**.

When our foremothers established the Scholarship Fund, and worked very hard to raise funds, they hoped that one day the Fund would be self-sustaining. In other words, the capital in the Fund would generate enough interest to cover our outlay of scholarships and bursaries. With interest rates being very low in the last few years, we have not quite reached the self-sustaining level. However, with rising interest rates, a self-sustaining Fund could potentially be a reality in the near future.

The Scholarship Fund is a **charity**. Those of you have made donations to the Scholarship Fund know that you receive charitable donation receipts to include with your income tax return.

As a charity, the Fund is required to do annual reports to the Canadian Revenue Agency that strictly control charities and their expenses. **The Scholarship Fund can only be used to pay out Scholarships. We cannot, therefore, dip into these funds for anything else.** The Scholarship Fund Committee can decide to hand out more (or fewer) scholarships or bursaries – that is their bailiwick. It has been suggested that we use these funds to keep our Club solvent – but as you can see, we are not allowed to do so.

MLUWC Club Expenses

Our Club has one bank account at the CIBC. Our budget for 2022-2023 is \$31,710 of expenses with anticipated revenues of \$28,000. Therefore, we have a projected deficit of \$3,710.

A couple of our expenses are on a per capita basis - \$85 for CFUW, \$2 to the CFUW Quebec Council. So, out of the \$120 you are currently paying in dues, the MLUWC is left with \$33 per member to pay our fixed costs. With only 148 members this year, this leaves us with \$4,884 to cover insurance, rent, web site, bank fees, PayPal fees, hospitality costs, etc. We also have to set aside money to send our President to the CFUW AGM. These meetings have been virtual (therefore free) since 2019, but the AGM is likely to be in person next year. Rest assured, we are as careful as possible with your money – we are not profligate.

Our overall numbers have dropped 25% since the start of the pandemic and this, despite attracting about 10 new members every year. There has an impact on all of us when membership drops significantly. Having fewer members means fewer people to share the fixed costs of the club. The Executive is very sensitive to this fact and has done everything possible to keep your out-of-pocket costs as low as possible. Most of us are retired and living on fixed incomes, so we understand that money is tight for many of you.

When I became president three years ago, we had over \$12,000 in the bank. We now have about \$5,000. Membership dues are not covering our costs. We have not raised dues for six years (since 2017/2018). We cannot continue to erode our bank balance. If we do, we will have no money left for emergencies or unforeseen expenses.

I hope this has given you a good overview of our finances. If you have anything that needs clarification, please do not hesitate to contact me.

CFUW NEWS.

Do you wonder what CFUW does nationally? Would you like to know what other clubs are doing across Canada, and maybe participate?

Check out the weekly Club Action Newsletter. Here is an excerpt from the new CFUW Advocacy section:

CFUW on Parliament Hill:

- The Department of Justice reached out to CFUW to meet as part of a larger consultation with women's organizations on upcoming changes to the sexual offenders registry.
- Presented a petition e-4185 on CFUW Resolution on Strengthening Bail Laws to Protect Victims of Inter-partner Violence
- Met with Minister of Public Safety, Marco Mendicino, with the #Women4GunControl Coalition on Bill C-21.
- Presented a submission to the House of Commons Committee on Bill C-35: *An Act for Respecting Early Learning and Child Care*.
- Bill C-226 on Environmental Racism and Justice passed in the House of Commons - Thank you to all those clubs and members who advocated on this important topic!

Following the difficulties during the pandemic, CFUW started the National Study Group on Long Term Care, which is collecting stories of Long Term Care (LTC) across the country in order to create a national picture of LTC in Canada. All members are encouraged to contribute.

University Women Helping Afghan Women is an outreach group started by CFUW-Ottawa that has been advocating on behalf of young Afghan women, and has provided over 100 scholarships. The return of the Taliban and their recent ban on women attending university has meant a halt to that program, but they are now in talks with a Canadian organization operating in Afghanistan to offer online education. New members are welcome.






Originally from a small hobby farm near Ottawa, Ontario, Ms. Reid moved to Iceland in 2003, five years after winning a student raffle for a date with the man who became her spouse. When her husband, Gudni Jóhannesson, took office as the President of Iceland on August 1, 2016, she found herself without defined roles or duties as the First Lady of Iceland. She has taken it upon herself to become active in promoting gender quality, entrepreneurship and innovation, tourism and sustainability, as well as Iceland’s rich literary heritage. She is a co-founder of Iceland’s Writers Retreat.

Her first book, *Secrets of the Sprakkar – Iceland’s Extraordinary Women and How They Are Changing the World*, has been an immediate bestseller in Iceland and Canada, and a *New York Times* Book Review Editors’ Pick. During her visit to Hudson, she will relate some of the inspirational stories of *Sprakkar* (i.e., outstanding women), as well as her own experiences as an emigrant to Iceland.

StoryFest is an annual literary festival in Hudson, Quebec, bringing the best writing to keen audiences every autumn for more than 20 years. The organizers are grateful to have a number of leading Hudson-area businesswomen/entrepreneurs sponsor part of the costs associated with this initial spring event.


