" What Does Climate Change Mean Today?"

"Start with a brief dive into basic science, then navigate through the economic, political, and psychological challenges of addressing climate change. The presentation will include examples from Quebec and Canadian politics as well as a quick look at international advancements. Join us for a concise exploration of the multifaceted dimensions of this critical issue."

Jamie is a graduate of political theory from Concordia University. His experience is defined by mobilization in the field and more particularly by his role in student mobilization during the 2019 climate strikes. That path has then led him to organize strikes, marches, conferences, and mediated gatherings to encourage collective and large-scale engagement.

More recently, Jamie has dedicated most of his time to regenerative farming. That direct connection to the land is a more personal way of understanding the land in its current state. Jamie's theoretical knowledge, his experience in climate mobilization, and his agricultural background bring an original perspective to the social, economic, and environmental issues that need to be assessed.

POTLUCK EVENTS JANUARY 15, 2024


This year we were able to have several very enjoyable in-person events and 1 zoom meeting.





LOOKING BACK TO LOOK FORWARD

Stories from the Archives

In 1966 the club was looking to contribute to a Centennial Project. A proposal was made to the membership to support libraries in the North of Canada by means of a financial contribution. After consultation with the Minister of Northern Affairs the club was referred to the Commissioner of the Northwest Territories. The need was felt to be greatest in this area, specifically the Mackenzie District which had only local volunteer libraries, and some school library facilities. A major Centennial Project for the NWT was to build a regional library at Hay River with a view to supporting 5 sub-libraries in the region.

It was agreed by the membership on Member's Night in April 1966 to donate \$200 specifically for the purchase of educational books for the new library. Moneys were redirected from some of the funds from the scholarship fund and additional contributions were made from selling advance tickets of EXPO '67 passports.

Letters in the archives show that MLUWC managed to come up with an extra \$300 to a total of \$500 to be donated to the newly built library. Acknowledgement 'gift plates' were pasted into each books donated. Titles that were purchased: Encyclopedia Canadiana, Encyclopedia Britannica and five copies of the Dictionary of Canadian Biography and Source Book of Canadian History as well as To Everything There is a Season by Rolof Beny.

Footnote: The library that was built as a Centennial Project is called the NWT Centennial Library in the downtown core of Hay River. It is still open to the public till this day.


