# **AGM Guest Speaker**



A writer based in Montreal, Afra Jalabi is Vice-Chair of a nongovernmental organization – The Day After Project – which has brought together a cross section of Syrians working for democracy in their country. Before the revolution she was a signatory of the Damascus Declaration, a 2005 statement by opposition groups and individuals demanding a multiparty democracy in Syria. The Declaration called for a gradual and peaceful transition to democracy and the equality of all citizens in a secular and sovereign Syria.

Ms. Jalabi is a member of the editorial board of the Journal of Law and Religion at Hamline University. She worked as a columnist in the Arab Press for 12 years.

She has a B.A. in anthropology and political science from McGill University, a Master's degree in journalism from Carleton University, and is a Ph.D. student at Concordia University, in the Department of Religion.

As a frequent lecturer on issues related to Islam, nonviolence, and the Middle East, with a recent focus on Syria for obvious reasons, she has appeared on Arab, American, and Canadian media including Al Jazeera, Orient, CBC, BBC, PBS and CTV.

#### Overview of the Federal Budget 2018

On February 27, 2018, the Federal Government tabled the budget for the 2018 fiscal year, the government's first budget with a gender-based analysis. Many welcomed measures to advance gender equality are present in the budget, including:

- A use-it-or-lose-it parental leave,
- Increased funding for a 5-day paid leave for survivors of domestic violence,
- Pay equity legislation,
- Increased funding for socio and economic measures for Indigenous Peoples, and
- Increased funding for skills and job training.

#### **GWI News**

CFUW leads off the GWI News with its publication of the executive summary of its **2018 Rural Women Survey**, conducted in preparation for the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (CSW62). Two hundred and forty-three members responded to the survey about their experiences in the following categories: Transportation, Health Care, Education, Technology, Gender Based Violence, Equity, Challenges and Opportunities. An additional survey for community organizations was developed to harvest information for rural community service agencies and advocates. The responses from the second/sister survey will be reviewed and shared when results are published. The Rural Women Survey results reveal patterns of opportunity and issues rural women in Canada face. This information empowered CFUW delegates to advocate for commitments from the United Nations Member states on achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) for rural women. CFUW sent a full delegation to attend CSW62 in March 2018.

#### Meet our GWI Representatives

**Dr. Maureen Byrne and Dr. Sophie Turner Zaretsky** presented their advocacy work towards the Sustainable Development Agenda, including representing GWI at the UN General Assembly, the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), the UN International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF), the Committee on the Elimination of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) and the Committee on the Status of Women (CSW). During the breakfast briefings Dr. Maureen Byrne also presented her work on the CSW Zero Draft Document and provided compelling information on the UNESCO report on education. Ms. Minard presented her work covering the High Level Political Forum. GWI commends all of its UN Representatives on their continuous commitment to making the voices of graduate women heard at the highest level of international governance and extends a warm welcome to our newly arrived UN Representative in New-York, Mariella Hannum.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

#### PROJECTED BUDGET 2018/2019

Revenues MLUWC income is based on the number of members and our projection is to keep the same number as the current year (188). This number can drop or rise. It will be accurate in September. Another source of revenue is advertising in the Newsletter. AGM and Convivium incomes are based on the numbers of attendees and the cost is almost covered by the attendance. Total of income projected is \$38,407.00.

Expenses: The predicted expenses seem stable from the current year for the majority of the fields shown in the chart, with the exception of the communication/Website and CFUW convention delegates. After the renewal of the MLUWC website, in 2017/18, the cost of maintaining an updated site and creating a French version is estimated at \$800.00. This is a substantial reduction compared to the last year's expense of \$3,000.

The CFUW AGM will be conducted as a one-day electronic format in June 2018. This does not cost anything. However, budgeting this annual expense (\$1,500) for 2018 means that it can be carried over to help defray the costs for other conference attendees in 2019.

The CFUW AGM in 2019 will be held in Winnipeg.

The total of projected expenses is \$30,036.00

The excess of revenues over expenses is \$8,371.00.

You will be asked to vote on this proposed Budget at the AGM in May.



## EXCESS OF REVENUES OVER EXPENSES Income minus expenses \$8,371



As we wind up our 60th anniversary year, I thought it would be fun to look back at the annual general meetings that have taken place over the years.

The MLUWC AGM and dinner has always been a highlight for our members. It is the time to summarize club business, introduce the new executive and say goodbye to the old. It is also a time for members to meet over a meal with friends.

Here are some of the different ways we have held our AGM's over the years:

1959: Held at Cedar Park United Church. A buffet was served for two dollars and was followed up by a one-act

play presented by the Drama Society.

1961: Held at the Beaconsfield Golf Club, The Canadian poet Irving Layton spoke on the topic of "economics in the moral climate". Tickets sold for three dollars.

1974: Gibby's in old Montreal, a luncheon and tour of Maison Saint Gabriel, historic home of the Congregation of Notre Dame. The total cost was \$4.50.

1979: Royal Montreal Golf Club, John Collins, political cartoonist from the Montreal Gazette. The cost was \$15.

1986: The Mount Stephen club where we learned some history of the man and his home. Tickets were \$20 each.

1994: Held at the Beaconsfield Golf Club, West Island and Canadian astronaut, Dr Dafyyd Williams, spoke about his training experiences. Tickets sold for \$33.75 and included wine with dinner.

1997: Held at the Saint James Club of Montreal. Irena Zantovska Murray gave a talk on Moshe Safdie, the architect of Habitat 67. Tickets sold for \$34 and included a South African wine tasting with wines supplied by the South African Consulate.

2015: Held at the Saint Raphael Golf Club, at a cost of \$45 wine not included, the keynote speaker was Bill Brownstein of the Montreal Gazette.
