Mr. Housefather has been an elected official for over 25 years. He served as a municipal councilor from 1994 to 2005, and as the Mayor of Côte Saint-Luc from 2005 to 2015.

Mr. Housefather holds a Bachelor of Civil Law and a Bachelor of Laws from McGill University, and a Master of Business Administration from Concordia University's John Molson School of Business. He worked at Dialogic Corporation, a multinational technology company, where he rose through the ranks to become Executive Vice-President of Corporate Affairs and General Counsel.

Mr. Housefather is active in his community, having served as a volunteer for many years with a number of community organizations. He is also a member of the local drama society and swim team. His performance in swimming earned him seven medals at the 2013 Maccabiah Games and five medals at the 2017 Maccabiah Games. The Maccabiah Games is an international multisport competition held every four years in Jerusalem.

Our project with Save the Children Canada for Mobile Learning Labs in Mozambique, impressed the evaluation committee. Education of women and girls has been a priority for CFUW since its inception in 1919. As stated by CFUW: "Helping to fund a project that will enable marginalized girls to obtain a secondary education speaks to our hearts. We particularly liked the ability for this project to be replicated."

CFUW's 100 chapters across Canada will be raising funds in support of this project until February 2024.

We are deeply grateful for this recognition of the importance of girls' education and for CFUW's belief in the work we do.

NOTES:

The club is still operating at a loss this year (\$161). as we have in the previous three years - losses of \$1,084 in 2022, \$482 in 2021 and \$2,308 in 2020. We have been able to sustain these losses due to the bank balance the club as built up over prior years. In 2023, the net loss was very favourable compared to budgeted loss of \$3,710 - mainly due to the GWI Surcharge (\$169 actual vs \$1,500 budget) and the donation to th Scholarship Fund (\$500 actual vs \$2,000 budget).

LOOKING BACK TO LOOK FORWARD

A NEW FEATURE FROM OUR ARCHIVIST, CENDRA PAAS

Stories from the Archives

In 1957 a telephone survey went out to university women graduates in the Lakeshore and district to ascertain how many would be interested in organizing a Lakeshore University Women's Club. There was also an invitation extended in the Lakeshore News (Lakeshore News and Chronicle, a local paper that ran from 1924-2015) to attend the first meeting on October 18 in St. Columba-by-the-Lake Presbyterian Church Hall. Nearly one hundred graduates from across Canada, a handful or European and American graduates that settled in the area came to that first meeting.

The women voted unanimously to "form a University Women's Club under constitution of the



Canadian Federation of University Women" (CFUW). An interim executive was proposed, as well as the name of 'Montreal Lakeshore and District University Women's Club' which was voted upon and passed until the next meeting.

Three guest speakers helped guide the new group: Mrs. John MacLaren from the newly formed St. Lambert's University Women's Club who outlined their program and difficulties they encountered and overcame; Miss Alice Miller, past president of McGill Alumnae Society and Program Director of Triennial Conference of CFUW who gave detailed guidance on the planning and organization of meetings and suggestions for activities; and Dr. Mary Winspear who spoke of the international aspects of the club outlining what takes place at Regional, National and International Conferences.

ONLINE CONSULTATION FOR THE SAFE LONG-TERM CARE ACT

A Message from Francis Scarpaleggia, Member of Parliament, Lac Saint-Louis

Dear Friend,

Every senior in Canada deserves to live in dignity, safety, and comfort, regardless of where they live. While a majority of Canadians want to age closer to home and their family, they also expect and deserve long-term care — if it is needed — to be high quality and safe.

The COVID-19 pandemic shone a light on the problems in long-term care (LTC) and highlighted long-standing and systemic challenges across Canada. As the pandemic exposed uncomfortable truths within LTC, the Government of Canada is taking action to meet the evolving needs of seniors and to work with provinces and territories in order to support improvements.

The government has announced the launch of a public online consultation to support the development of a Safe Long-Term Care Act.

The development of the Safe Long-Term Care Act builds on the federal government's commitment to support seniors and persons with disabilities across the country. On January 31, 2023, the government welcomed the release of two independent LTC standards from CSA Group and the Health Standards Organization (HSO), which provide guidance for delivering services that are safe, reliable and — most importantly — centred on residents' needs.

The 60-day online consultation invites people, including LTC residents and their families, to share their perspectives and expertise on how to improve the quality and safety of LTC, foster the implementation of the LTC standards, address human resources challenges, and strengthen accountability in the LTC sector. Feedback will help inform the drafting of the legislation.

Recognizing traditional jurisdictional responsibilities over the delivery of LTC, the Government of Canada will also work with provincial and territorial governments on the Safe Long-Term Care Act and how to best support the delivery of quality and safe LTC services. The consultations will also include discussions and roundtables with relevant experts and stakeholders to obtain advice on how federal legislation can help support improvements in the quality and safety of LTC.

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
