PRESIDENT

Our year started in May with the official transfer of Executive Portfolios and a potluck dinner. This is a great way to say goodbye to members who have contributed so much to our Club and to say hello to our new Executive. Monthly Executive meetings begin in August and are held at the Residence Le Sélection. We have many hard-working volunteers who run our committees and who ensure that the Club is run smoothly. We are fortunate to have a large group of volunteers, not just in the Executive, who make our Club such a success.

In June, Jane Cowell-Poitras did a wonderful job of representing the MLUWC at the CFUW's Annual General Meeting held at Brock University, St. Catharines, Ontario. The topic of GWI (formerly IFUW) dues was and continues to be an important topic of conversation throughout the year. Should we agree to a CFUW increase, this amount would only come into effect for the 2018-2019 year. Declining memberships and rising costs are affecting everyone and are of concern for the MLUWC. A motion was brought forth at the March general meeting and members voted in favour of an increase of \$10.00 in the Club's annual fees. Therefore, the MLUWC Club fees for the 2017-2018 year will be \$120.

The Programme and Fundraising Committees worked hard to present us with a great line-up of monthly speakers and new Fundraising Events. Fundraising does such a good job that we were able to increase our bursary amounts. We are forecasting that about \$16,000 will have been raised this year. The Spring Fundraiser is already sold out! Our Christmas Concert continues to be a great opportunity to come together and help local charities; food was collected for the West Island Mission and \$1305 was given to the Dorval Omega Centre.

This has been a year of change for our Club; we have a committee working on a new, more user-friendly website, we have introduced PayPal and expanded our social media exposure through Facebook, Twitter and LinkedIn. We have been taking advantage of our association with the City of Beaconsfield and other municipalities to advertise in their community magazines and billboards.

As your new President, I had the opportunity to represent the Club, along with other Club members, at different community events this year: assisting the Kiwanis at the Xmas Train, the WIWC Women's Day Breakfast, Zonta Lunch for International Women's Day, MCW luncheon, and other various networking events around the West Island at which I am always happy to extol the virtues of our Club. We are all doing what we can in order not to be "The Best Kept Secret of the West Island".

The Quebec Provincial Council of University Women meets twice a year and consists of the five CFUW Clubs in Quebec. In October, the meeting was hosted by the SSUWC in St. Lambert and the Sherbrooke & District club hosted the spring meeting. All MLUWC members are encouraged to attend. It is a great opportunity to meet with other Clubs and to learn from each other.

Thank you to all of the volunteers and Committee Leaders, without whom I could not do my job. For the new year, I am looking forward to representing our Club in Richmond BC in June and to representing you as President during our upcoming 60th Anniversary year!

VP/CFUW LIAISON

CFUW President Karen Dunnett resigned in December and President Designate Grace Hollett took over as the new President.

CFUW's advocacy priorities for this year were Gender-Based Violence, Child Care, and Electoral Reform. A brief was sent to the Standing Committee on the Status of Women for their study on Violence against Young Women and Girls which was quoted in their final report! A brief was also sent to the Standing Committee on the Status of Women for their study on Women's Economic Security.

Letters were sent on Canada's first Gender-based Analysis budget, integrated public transportation, electoral reform, support for a National Early-learning and Childcare Strategy, a plea to repeal the safe third country act, our concerns and changes we would like to see in CSW 61 agreed conclusions, delays to reforming the Access to Information Act, to the Minister of International Affairs on Turkish Parliament passing a bill, which lowers the age of consent to 12. CFUW also issued a Joint public statement on Trump's Global Gag Rule.

Five Resolutions were passed at the 2016 AGM in Saint Catharines, Ontario: 1) Ending the Marginalization of Indigenous Women in Canadian Society, 2) Diagnostic, Intervention and Support Plan for children, adults and families affected by FASD, 3) Strengthen the Pest Management Regulatory Agency in Order to Protect the Environment, 4) Electoral reform: Adding Proportionality to the Electoral System in Canada 5) Sustainable Development Goals.

Two Resolutions have been proposed this year:

Resolution 1: The Right to Safe, Clean, Accessible and Affordable Drinking Water and

Sanitation on First Nations Reserves in Canada

Proposed by: The University Women's Club of Winnipeg

Resolution 2: Universal Pharmacare

Proposed by: University Women's Club of North York

Two amendments to the CFUW Constitution have been proposed:

Amendment 1: add 'Regional Directors' to the list of standing committees mentioned in Article 54 of the CFUW by-laws.

Proposed by the Regional Directors Group

Amendment 2: In Canadian Federation of University Women Articles and Bylaws – Articles, strike out Article 4 - Membership in International Federation of University Women (IFUW) CFUW shall be a member of the IFUW.

Proposed by CFUW St. Thomas

In 2016, CFUW St. Thomas brought forward the same motion, which was narrowly defeated.

GWI voted for a significant dues increase at the triennial meeting in August 2016. In January 2017 this increase was postponed indefinitely.

CFUW was represented by a self-funded delegation of 20 members at the 61st United Nations Commission on the Status of Women in New York in March.

CFUW will celebrate its 100th Anniversary in 2019. MLUWC is proposing three of our members for the CFUW 100th Anniversary Notable Women Awards: Elizabeth Semmelhaack, Françoise Perreault and Renata Sutherland.

CFUW's Annual General Meeting for 2016-2017, to be held June 22 to 25, is being hosted by the Richmond BC Club. Proposed dues increases for both CFUW and GWI will be voted on at this meeting, along with the Resolutions and Constitutional Amendments.

<u>Facebook</u> page contines to be an information tool about the MLUWC and its activities. It continues to generate viewer interest and a regular following of viewers.

Recommendation: Continue with Facebook, expand on the frequency and variety of postings plus start to measure the progression (likes & shares).

<u>Advertising</u> of info sessions, special meetings (Convivium, Holiday Evening, AGM), fundraising events plus scholarship applicant invitations were announced through the website, newsletter, Facebook, blogger sites and other media outlets.

Recommendation: Continue to advertise on these selected outlets.

<u>Postcards</u>, continue to be an effective means of advertising for fundraising activities.

Recommendation: Continue to advertise fundraising activities using postcards.

<u>Posters</u> were discontinued as a means of advertising for the info sessions and other activities (excluding the fundraising activities) as the conclusion was reached that this type of advertising had not in the recent past generated outside membership participation, contrary to Facebook and website advertising of such events that had attracted participation and membership inquiries.

Recommendation: Continue to advertise using posters for only the fundraising activities.

Press releases were submitted to the media outlets for special announcements and activities.

Recommendation: A media campaign on the MLUWC should be launched to raise the awareness of the MLUWC.

<u>Thoughtful Cards</u> (sympathy & get well) were sent out to members when notified by a club member in addition to the condolence announcements mentioned in the newsletter.

Recommendation: Continue with this practise as it is an expression of comfort and support to the member(s).

WEBSITE REPORT

<u>General information</u> reviews and updates were conducted on all of the website pages after the AGM. Recommendation: Continue to do an annual update after the AGM and just before the Convivium.

Monthly information pertaining to activities and events was kept current.

Recommendation: Continue to do updates on a monthly basis and need to basis of the activities and events.

<u>Email addresses and passwords</u> were reassigned to Board members with newly appointed portfolios. Two additional email addresses were created (Treasurer & Survey).

Recommendation: None.

Airmiles Donation Program was reinstated.

Recommendation: Continue with the posting of the Airmiles Donation Program in the monthly newsletter.

<u>PayPal</u> is being set up and incorporated onto the website by the Treasurer and President to facilitate payment of the annual dues.

Recommendation: To be kept as a direct responsibility of the Treasurer.

<u>Website Survey</u> invitation to the entire membership was initiated in January 2016 to better understand and evaluate the members' current usage patterns and information needs. A report, due to be completed by April 2017, is to be presented to the Executive Board members for discussion.

Recommendation: Executive Board members are to evaluate the results of the Website Survey.

<u>Website revamp</u> following the completion of the Website Survey, the Executive has asked the Website Committee to investigate different website options with the goal of creating a new, modern website that will best suit the MLUWC budget and creative objectives and help the MLUWC attract new members.

TREASURER

Revenues from membership dues were slightly lower, when compared to last year, owing to a decrease in membership, in spite of the 9 new members added.

Expenses: Our rental fees for Karnak almost doubled. Expenses for the CFUW AGM, since it took place in Ontario, were significantly lower than the previous year.

A donation of \$250 was given to the Charitable CFUW Trust for the Ecole Polytechnique Scholarship Award. The club also made its annual contribution of \$200 to the Virginia Gildersleeve International Fund (VGIF).

On February 20th, 2017, the Executive Committee decided that the money held in the Manulife Account (\$1,670), previously designated to be used for 100th Anniversary of CFUW, will be dispersed in the following matter: \$200 will be given to CFUW's special anniversary Fund (2019) and the remainder will be used by the Club for special scholarship or bursaries (2017/18). These amounts are indicated in the pie chart as "special expenses".

At the time of writing, final numbers are not available for the AGM and some expenses related to hospitality and others.



We are hoping to increase that amount after the bake sale and "one time" book sale to be held at the April meeting.

This year we decided to change the Spring event from Games Day to a fashion evening with well-known style consultant Kathryn Mademann. It is a "ladies night out" that is full of fun. Monthly meetings:

- September 2016 Convivium. Held at the Beaconsfield Golf Club, there was a good turnout for the meet and greet with the successful sign up for the many activity groups.
- October 2016 More than Buzzwords: What beekeeping has taught me about sustainable living. Speaker: Shona Watt, Environmentalist / Bee keeper. Shona gave us insight into urban bee keeping and we learned quite a bit about the bee keeping world. Prior to her presentation we were pleased to hear the career aspirations of this year's Scholarship winners as they gave their short presentations.
- November 2016 <u>Grand Plans: Hospital Architecture in Montreal, 1893-2016</u>. Speaker: Dr. Annmarie Adams, Chair, Dept. of Social Studies of Medicine, McGill University. Annmarie gave a wonderful talk on the architectural history of the Royal Victoria Hospital as well as interesting insight from an architect's point of view of the new super hospitals in Montreal. Her passion for old buildings was very evident.
- December 2016 Christmas Raffle and Carols, Summerlea United Church, Lachine. McGill Conservatory Youth Choir. We were entertained by the beautiful pure voices of the young people from the McGill Youth choir, a group composed of young people from the West Island between the ages of 12 and 17. The interesting seasonal songs by these young voices really helped to set that Christmas atmosphere. Suzanne Chausse and the interest groups provided intriguing baskets that allowed us to raise \$1305 to benefit the Dorval Omega Centre. Teodor Vidam who represented the Omega Centre gave an interesting overview of the Centre and the types of activities that they support in order to help adults with mental health issues help themselves. Many members also donated non-perishable food items for the West Island Mission. All participants and volunteers contributed to a wonderful evening.
- January 2017 <u>Potluck Dinners</u>, lunch, or high-tea (please refer to the annual report for the Potluck dinner group for the details).
- February 2017 From the light microscope to the dark side the academic career requires learning by doing Speaker: Dr. Anja Geitmann, Dean, Faculty of Agriculture and

Environmental Sciences, McGill University. Dr. Geirmann gave an entertaining and informative talk about the microscope and the sex lives of plants. Her videos were terrific.

- March 2017 Members' Night: Getting to know us. Discussion of Resolutions. Artistic expressions and more (all members). Members night speakers were Pat Jones, Heather Trump, and Jocelyne Faille. It was great to learn more about the Healing Pathway (Pat Jones) and the career pathways of Heather and Jocelyne, two new members. Our President also gave a presentation promoting the MLUWC and encouraging us all to spread the word.
- April 2017 How the evolving role of Nurse Practitioners will impact your health care. Speaker: Shannon McNamara, RN, MScN, SNP, Cardiology and Cardiac Surgery (former recipient of a MLUWC bursary). Shannon reviewed the rocky history of the Nurse Practitioner's role; it's evolution through the years and where we are now. We learned more about provincial and international differences in legislation, practice norms and education standards. Most importantly, we got to appreciate the impact of Nurse Practitioners on our health and access to the Health care system.
- May 2017 <u>Annual General Meeting and Dinner</u>, Beaconsfield Golf Club. Music and Media in Mutation a view from Montreal. Keynote speaker: Kelly Rice, University Advancement, Schulich School of Music, McGill University As a broadcaster, producer and lecturer, Kelly Rice is a passionate voice for music in Montreal. For over two decades, he was a producer and broadcaster at CBC. He continues to be very active in the arts community as a journalist and board member, and hosts pre-concert lectures at the Orchestre symphonique de Montréal and other ensembles.

SCHOLARSHIP

The Scholarship Committee this year consisted of Maria DeWolfe, Cendra Paas, Pauline van Nieuwburg, Hillie Viires and Joanna Zaichowsky. The chair position was shared by Jill Rollins and Theresa Sliz.

The Committee met in the fall to get acquainted and to set our agenda for the year. At that time we also updated the posters and application forms for the Margaret Manson and Alberta Shearer Scholarships, and planned our publicity procedures. We also added a Photograph Permission page to the website which grants the MLUWC permission to take photographs of the awardees and authorizes the MLUWC to use and publish the same in print and/or electronically.

As in previous years, the highlight of the October monthly meeting was the attendance and presentations of the Margaret Manson Scholarship, the Alberta Shearer, and the Amy Williams Scholarship recipients who each spoke to us about their studies and aspirations. All were extremely appreciative of our support, and the club members in turn were most impressed by their passion and dedication in their respective fields of study.

We received a total of 13 applications for the 2017 Margaret Manson and Alberta Shearer Scholarships. At the time of this report, the committee has not yet met to discuss the applicants and select those who will be interviewed.

This coming year, the MLUWC will celebrate its 60th anniversary and to honor this occasion the club has decided to offer an additional scholarship in this year only. The amount of the scholarship will be \$2000, the same amount of the other scholarships awarded. The committee will select candidates for this scholarship from those applications already received. In addition, all those awarded a scholarship will also be given a one-year guest membership in the MLUWC.

The support the club extends to adults returning to complete their high school studies is continuing, through bursaries provided to le Centre d'éducation des adultes Jeanne Sauvé and to the Place Cartier Adult Education Centre. This year the committee recommended changes to the amount of the bursaries as shown below. The changes were approved by the executive as well as by the membership at the December meeting.

The \$600 bursary for a student of limited financial means in a John Abbott College technical program continues and was awarded in the fall semester. This bursary was awarded to a mature student who immigrated to Canada in 2012 and is currently completing the Biopharma program.

MONTREAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN (MCW/CFM)

Founded in November 1893, the Montreal Council of Women, directly affiliated with the National Council of Women in Canada, is a non-partisan, non-confessional federation that brings together 70 voluntary organizations and 80 individual members from Montreal and surrounding region. The membership represents 30,000 women who work together to achieve the objectives of the Council, which are the improvement of social conditions, particularly for women and children. It prides itself on the ability to bring together people of different cultures and backgrounds to work together for the betterment of society in an atmosphere of mutual respect and tolerance.

General Council meetings of the Montreal Council of Women are **held monthly on the second Thursday of every month at "Les Jardins du Canal", 2700 Rufus Rockhead in Montreal.** Except for two evening meetings at 6:00 p.m. (light supper \$10.00) on October 6th, 2016 and April 6th, 2017, the monthly MCW meetings were held at 12:00 noon (Lunch \$10.00) with an afternoon program of interesting and inspiring guest speakers.

Shirley Gyles became President after having served as Executive Vice-President and Bulletin Editor for two years. For over 25 years she has been the President of the Coloured Women's Club and has served on other boards including the Negro Community Center, and the South Shore Black Community Association. She was MCW's Woman of the Year in 2002.

THE YEAR'S PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS:

<u>September 2016</u> – The guest speaker was *Penny Rankin*, Co-chair of Refugee Support Program at St. Matthias' and St. Mark's Anglican Churches. Her inspiring presentation, entitled "Statistics and Strategies: A Crisis Unfolding" focused on the refugee status around the world as well as her own experience in sponsoring a Syrian couple to Canada.

<u>October 2016</u> – *Elizabeth Johnston*, author, professor of creative writing and certified autography coach, delivered a very insightful presentation on how one goes about "*Writing about your life*". For more information on E. Johnston and the services she offers, visit her website: ownyourcreativity.com

<u>November 2016</u> – An informative presentation by <u>Ms. Nadia De Riggi</u>, a notary with Lamarre and Di Riggi, spoke on various aspects of her career and the different services provided by a notary – importance of having a will, mandate; duties of a power of attorney; difference between a notary and a lawyer.

<u>December 2016</u> – The "WOMAN OF THE YEAR AWARD" LUNCHEON" was held at the Hotel Omni Mont-Royal and was attended by 45 plus members, guests, and former "Women of the Year" recipients. Its focus was to honour a woman who has made an outstanding contribution towards Suicide Prevention. The 2016 honoree, Monique Séguin, Ph.D., is a professor in the Department of Psychology and Psychoeducation at Université du Québec en Outaouais. She is a researcher at the McGill Group for Suicide Studies and at the Quebec Network on Suicide, Mood Disorder and Related Disorders. It was an informative and successful afternoon.

<u>February 2017</u> – A brief historical overview on the topic of "Women's Mental Health across the Life Cycle" was given Dr. Maria di Tomasso. She showed how mental health needs differ across the lifespan, from child rearing to the menopausal years and later in life. She described mental health as a state of wellbeing in which every individual realises her or his own potential, can cope with the stresses of life, can work productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a contribution to one's community. Dr. di Tomasso ended her very informative presentation on a positive note with some recommendations for optimal aging. She insisted on the importance of positive thinking, social and physical activity, learning to manage stress and lifelong learning to activate brain neurons.

<u>March 2017</u> – Mylène Freeman's experience as a young woman in politics was addressed in her presentation "Why I ran...and is there a difference between male and female candidates". Elected at age 22 as NDP MP for Argenteuil-Papineau-Mirabel, Mylène had had very little political experience and she realized that being a young woman she was less valued, had fewer opportunities and had to work harder to gain some recognition. During her time on Parliament Hill (2011-2015), Mylène did notice a difference between female and male MP's. Women are more likely to experience some workplace harassment and are often the targets of hate mails and hate speeches via social media, which provide people with the necessary anonymity to make direct threats and be extremely violent. In spite of the many challenges facing young women, Mylène also advocated for more women to seek political office, women who will demand better policies that will benefit and empower all women. Hateful speech in all its forms should be denounced and instead openness, respect and gender equality should be fostered.

<u>April 2017</u>– MCW celebrated the "150th ANNIVERSARY of CANDA" at a fun evening meeting which included a supper meal with tantalizing food from across our great land, participating in a short quiz on the history of Canada and the screening of "Quilt of Belonging", a film that shares the story of making an immense collaborative art project: a 120-foot-long textile mosaic, which is the work of volunteers from Victoria to Newfoundland to the Arctic Circle. Participants were invited to contribute their talents and ideas, reflected through the prism of their cultural backgrounds - range of materials used, from sealskin to African mud-cloth, from embroidered silk to gossamer wings of butterflies.

<u>May 2017</u> - The MCW Annual General Meeting and Silent Auction will be held on May 18th, 2017 at 12:00 noon. The AGM of the National Council of Women Councils will take place in Ottawa in June. The following RESOLUTIONS will be presented: The Provision of Humane Holding Conditions for Migrant Detainees; Environmental Harm from Cigarette Filters; Safety of Food Additive Azodicarbonamide; Increasing Security by Relocating Railways to Outlying Areas; Addressing Aboriginal Suicide.

The Montreal Council of Women publishes *a monthly BULLETIN* and its website: montrealcouncilwomen.org provides an important role as a voice for women in Montreal and surrounding areas.

ISSUES TO ACTION

This past year we followed several major issues: electoral reform; sexual violence against women, especially against indigenous women and women on university campuses; financial literacy; and the immigration detention of children.

Electoral Reform: We looked forward to the final report of the Electoral Reform committee, but were disappointed with its failure to recommend a specific type of proportional representation. The survey that was sent to the whole population did not result in any consensus.

Violence against Women and Girls: The CFUW brief to the Committee on the Status of Women was made available at the Convivium and on the web. We were asked to participate in the survey of the sexual assault policies on university campuses.

This is in addition to the survey of university campuses comparing the general status of women in universities today with the original survey done 25 years ago.

Resolutions and By-law Amendments. Two resolutions were received: one on Universal Pharmacare and the other on the "Provision of Safe Drinking Water to Indigenous Peoples". Two changes to the CFUW By-laws were also received and discussed, the more significant one is about whether the CFUW should remain a part of the GWI. They have not yet been voted on.

Financial Literacy. Constance Ellis arranged one workshop centering on Wills and Estates. We are collecting information and materials and have found several websites that will be very beneficial to our members.

Immigration and Refugee Issues: The arrival of Syrian refugees is being followed with the West Island Refugee Network. We are also following the government's promises to improve the conditions of children who are detained in unsuitable premises, sometimes in criminal detention facilities.

We have been asked to consider what can be done about the inequality of cosmetic and other products between men and women, known as the Pink Tax.

The Issues to Action Group is reaching out to organizations like Care-Jeunesse, FADOQ (Fédération des ainés et ainées du Québec) and CARP (the Canadian Association of Retired People).

Up-dates:

Micro-beads were declared toxic in June 2016, but will be officially banned only in 2019.
