Sam Watts Executive Director,

Welcome Hall Mission.

Established in 1892, Welcome Hall Mission is the largest doorway to help for Montrealers in need. It operates in 7 locations in the city, has a professional staff team of more than 160 people and an annual budget of approximately 30 million dollars. The Mission has provided services to women since its inception. An early mission statement included the goal of preventing cruelty to women – a much overlooked societal reality in the early 20th century.

Welcome Hall Mission has a history of offering innovative programs that are designed to help people become independent. The philosophy is one of offering a "helping hand" rather than a "handout". The presentation to the MLUWC will highlight a number of the programs that are offered in 2022 to support those experiencing homelessness, young single mothers, families, and at-risk youth in the Montreal region. It will also cover how the establishment of partnerships with the healthcare network is an essential part of offering effective solutions to the vulnerable and disconnected.

Sam Watts CEO/Executive Director Welcome Hall Mission

Sam is the CEO of Welcome Hall Mission, an organization founded in 1892. It is dedicated to providing shelter, food and love to Montrealers in need. The Mission has an annual budget of approximately 30 million dollars, more than 160 full time employees and over 400 volunteers.

The Mission is dedicated to eradicating chronic homelessness and hunger in Montreal. It operates emergency and supported housing services. It has a mental health treatment unit affiliated with McGill and the Psychiatry Department of the Jewish General Hospital. It also operates a free Dental Clinic, managed in a partnership with McGill University's Faculty of Dentistry. The youth services team manages an innovative program called "Coeur a Soeur" that provides practical support to young mothers and their children.

Sam is the author of "Good Work Done Better", a book that proposes ideas for how community-based non-profit organizations can improve their impact. He has also authored numerous articles that have appeared in local and national publications.

He began his career in management at a Fortune 100 company in Montreal. In various global leadership roles, he learned to understand and appreciate principles that are required to turn good teams into high-performing teams. From 2001 to 2015, he was a team effectiveness consultant to corporations, governments and not for profit organizations acting as a catalyst, facilitator and executive coach.

Sam serves on a number of non-profit boards including The Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness and L'Arche Canada. He lives in Beaconsfield, QC.



In March, the **Advocacy Committee of the Quebec Council of CFUW (QC-CFUW) is** planning an Ecological Footprint Calculation activity for the six Quebec Clubs. The objective of the exercise is to measure the demand and supply of nature. The details of how to proceed will be forwarded to you in March. The club with the most participants will be recognized at the QC-CFUW on April 23rd, 2022.

Canada's Opioid Crisis

In June 2021, at the AGM of CFUW, participating members from clubs from across Canada, voted to adopt MLUWC'S proposed resolution, <u>Canada's Opioid Crisis</u>. Chitra Chopra and I were delighted that our months of hard work had not gone in vain, and we were very pleased to bring this honour to our club. Since the adoption of our resolution, unfortunately, the number of deaths caused by overdoses of opioids, in particular opioids laced with illegal drugs, has increased significantly. This sad story plays out in every town and city across Canada. First and foremost, we need more safe injection sites across the country and these sites must be easily accessible. At these sites, trained professionals can work to help the people who avail themselves of this service. We need to act, and we have to do so now. Every CFUW includes a suggested Action Plan. Our Advocacy Committee has opted to follow the plan of letter writing. We are asking you, please, to write letters to your local politicians at the federal, provincial, and municipal levels in order to heighten their awareness of our opioid crisis and to introduce legislation to help to resolve it. With this article comes a template of a letter that you can use for the different politicians.

Please, I urge you to rise from your January blues, take action and help hundreds of vulnerable lives.

CFUW is a member of the UNCSW and sends delegates each year. You can apply to participate as one of our delegates.



Members of organizations like CFUW will attend *virtually*. Protocols regarding virtual delegations have yet to be announced. As such, **CFUW will notify members as soon as our internal delegate application is launched**.

The <u>NGO CSW Forum</u> runs parallel to the official session taking place at the UN Headquarters by hosting events organized by non-government organizations (NGOs). The NGO CSW is free and open to everyone and allows civil society the opportunity to engage in the processes and CSW sessions, outside of the formal UNCSW forum. 
