DUES INCREASE

At the last Executive meeting the following resolution was passed unanimously:

"Effective with the 2023-2024 year, the MLUWC membership dues will increase by \$10 to \$130."

CFUW 2023 RESOLUTIONS

The following policy resolutions will be voted on at the 2023 CFUW AGM. They will be discussed at the April 6 Advocacy meeting at 7:30 pm. All MLUWC members are welcome to give their feedback at this Zoom meeting. We will be voting on the final version of the resolutions at our AGM on May10. Please note that there will be no further discussion at that time. **Ctrl+Click** on the Resolution title below to read the full background information.

Resolution - CFUW Halifax Title: Immigration Detention in Canada

RESOLVED, That the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) urge the Government of Canada, provincial and territorial governments to:

- 1. Abolish the use of correctional facilities for the purpose of immigration detention and end provincial contracts with the Canadian Border Services Agency (CBSA).
- 2. Utilize alternate options of immigration monitoring.
- 3. Support the passage of Bill C-20, The Public Complaints and Review Commission Act

Resolution - CFUW Hamilton

Title: A comprehensive maternal death prevention strategy

RESOLVED, that the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) urge the federal government to work with the provinces/territories to establish a national system to collect and share consistent disaggregated data on maternal deaths (stripped of confidential information) and close calls, with health care providers.

RESOLVED, that the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) urge the provincial and territorial governments to promote enhanced education of health care providers and improved public education of patient populations as part of this initiative

Resolution - CFUW International Relations Committee Title: Impact of international trade agreements

RESOLVED, that CFUW urge the federal government to use international trade agreements as instruments to accelerate the achievement of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), specifically; goal 3 good health and well-being, goal 4 quality education, goal 8 decent work and economic growth, goal 10 reduced inequalities and goal 12 responsible consumption and production.

RESOLVED, that CFUW urge the federal government to include women's organizations in all aspects of developing and evaluating Canadian international trade agreements.

RESOLVED, that CFUW urge the federal government to ensure that current and future international trade agreements are used as tools to maximize efforts to promote gender equality, food security and support sustainable economic development.

Resolution - CFUW Perth and District

Title: <u>Fair Treatment for Canadians Suffering from Chronic Lyme Disease and</u> <u>Other Tick-borne Diseases</u>

RESOLVED, That the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) strongly urge the federal government and all relevant provincial bodies (governments, public health agencies, medical associations, and colleges of physicians and surgeons) to:

- Recognize all 15 of the 2022 World Health Organization's (WHO) ICD-11, the medical diagnostic codes for chronic Lyme disease, and thus, recognize chronic Lyme as a <u>treatable</u> disease in Canada;
- **Provide access to treatment** for chronic Lyme (and other chronic tick-borne diseases) under our publicly-funded health care systems (e.g., OHIP, etc.) so that chronic Lyme disease patients do not have to pay out of pocket for medical care;
- Employ the International Lyme and Associated Diseases Society (ILADS) Diagnostic and Treatment Guidelines as the primary guidelines in the treatment of acute and chronic Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases.

RESOLVED, That CFUW urge medical schools across Canada to:

- Include comprehensive, evidence-based learning about Lyme disease and other tickborne disease in their curriculum;
- Adopt the ILADS diagnostic and treatment guidelines as the primary, evidence-based approach to diagnosis and treatment of Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases;
- Educate medical doctors and other health practitioners to rely on a **clinical diagnosis** of Lyme disease as recommended by Health Canada.

This annual event will be held in Quebec City on April 22 at Laval University. The assembly and conference will also be offered in a comodal format (face-to-face and virtual). Our guest speaker for the occasion will be **Johanne Jutras** who will deal with pornography, a subject she knows well judging by the study she has just published (see attached documents). She wishes to inform participants that her presentation does not include any explicit sexual image.

For the meal that will be served on site, we have selected a Tunisian caterer for originality and flavor. Note that this kitchen uses nuts: notice to those who may be allergic. As the meeting falls in the middle of Ramadan, our supplier must receive the order 3 weeks in advance.

We also thought of offering you, as a post-meeting activity, a 2-hour walking tour of Old Quebec with a professional guide. However, registrations are limited to a maximum of twelve people. After this guided tour, for those who wish, you would be invited to share a 5 à 7 in a friendly atmosphere at the Château Frontenac (the visit is offered by the AFDU Quebec club and the 5 à 7 is at the expense of the participants). "PORNOGRAPHIES" BY JOHANNES JUTRAS

Summary

Pornography is a subject of moral, cultural, philosophical, political, and scientific controversy. Of course, the economic and social stakes are important, and we must understand the signage along the way. In order to critically parse through this dense landscape, it's critical that we equip ourselves with a minimum of reliable knowledge to analyze the meaning(s) of this phenomenon. This work is a summary of the book "Pornographies"..., published in French in 2021. It is also a tool to help people learn about the observed effects of the consumption of various types of pornography on sexual health and with regards to sexual offences. This article is based on 140 research papers written by 128 women and 75 men from 1980 to 2019. They were using study objects and Québec subjects who were able to express their perceptions and points of view on the themes addressed by scientists. In Pornographies..., feminist pornography is not discussed since no Québec scientist has yet studied its effects on sexual health and sexual offences from theyears 2000 to 2019. In addition, the data used here regarding sexual of fences are the most recent produced by the Ministère de la Sécurité publique du Québec (MSPQ) and Statistics Canada. Finally, this summary presents a bibliography of the studies and research in several disciplines such as sociology, sexology, psychology, and crime involved in the writing of the book.

"Pornographies"... available at https://boutique.bouquinbec.ca/pornographies.html. Divided into 11 chapters, this summary answers the following five questions about gay, child, and mainstream pornography: What is pornography? Who is interested in it? What are its links and effects on sexual health? What are its links and effects on sexual assault against women and children? Can we become addicted to pornography?

Good reading !A few words about the author **Johanne Jutras** is currently a student in the sexual health certificate program at Université Laval. She holds a bachelor's degree in Environmental Design from UQAM (1977), a master's degree in Regional Development from the Université du Québec à Rimouski (UQAR) (1980), a master's degree in Measurement and Evaluation (1996), and a Graduate Diploma in Feminist Studies (2010) from Université Laval. From 1992 to 2013, Johanne Jutras was a program evaluation consultant at the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications. She published several assessments and evaluation reports on laws, strategies, and programs in the field of culture and the status of women. Since 2013, Johanne Jutras has written several briefs for the Intersyndicale des femmes during government consultations and has written book reviews for the journal Recherches féministes. Johanne Jutras is also an activist on the Vigilancemédias committee of the Centre des femmes de la BasseVille. She lives in Québec City." **Pornographies**. ".. Summary, Johanne Jutras, 2022, 62 p.






