Wine Tasting & Pairing 101

This presentation will introduce participants to the basics of wine tasting and pairing wine with foods. By the end of this presentation, participants will understand the factors that give a wine its unique and distinguishing characteristics, the standard practices to taste and appreciate wine, and the common strategies to pair food and wine.

Jordan LeBel is a professor in the department of marketing of the John Molson School of Business at Concordia University where he teaches The Marketing of Food. He has been a pioneer of online education with his award-winning online course Marketing Yourself, taken by over 20,000 students. Graduate from the *Institut de tourisme et d'hôtellerie du Québec*, he started his career in foodservice serving notably as restaurant inspector for Distinguished Restaurants of North America and becoming Executive Chef. Jordan taught foodservice management in Norway, in Switzerland and in the United States at Cornell University's famed School of Hotel Administration. He has won numerous awards for his teaching and leadership in higher education including the prestigious 3M National Teaching Award. He is particularly interested in issues of governance at the intersection of food marketing and public health. Jordan is very involved in the Quebec agrifood sector; he is a member of the standing scientific committee on obesity prevention at the National institute of public health. His expertise and wide perspective make him a sought-after commentator in the media; he has served as a regular columnist for a variety of television, radio, and print outlets.

CFUW UPDATE

THE "SHE BELONGS IN SCHOOL" PROJECT

Each year the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) recommends an international Service Project for Club support. For 2023-2024, the project for CFUW Club support is "She Belongs in School." This project will bring High School Education to vulnerable girls in Mozambique.

"She Belongs in School" is a 60 Million Girls Foundation Organization project. It involves a mobile learning lab which brings the school to students' homes. The Mobile Learning Lab is solar-powered and self-contained. Each lab costs approximately \$5000.

CFUW's contribution to the "She Belongs in School" project will focus on young pregnant mothers and girls who have experienced child, early and forced marriage and are approximately 16-19 years of age.

Your Club or individual members can donate towards the cost of the Mobile Learning Labs. Any donations must be made directly to the organization "60 Million Girls" by going to https://60millionsdefilles.org/. This site provides instructions for donating online or sending a cheque. If sending a cheque please add, Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) in the note section. Personal tax receipts are issued automatically for online donations. If donating by cheque, a tax receipt will be mailed to you.



CFUW CHARITABLE TRUST FRENCH SPEAKING VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The CFUW Charitable Trust assists women university graduates, the future of our country, to further their post-secondary education. The Trust raises money to support annual Fellowships, Awards and Grants for Canadian women doing advanced graduate study and research in science, math, engineering, home economics, education, visual arts, music, humanities, and social sciences.

The Charitable Trust receives funds from members, Clubs, and corporate sponsors. It administers an investment portfolio of over one million dollars for fifteen CFUW Fellowships and Awards, valued at over ninety thousand dollars yearly.

For the last four years, I have had the pleasure of sitting on the Charitable Trust Fellowship Committee. Using our personal experience and a pre-existing grid, we evaluate the hundreds of requests for scholarships that are received each year. This usually takes place between November and April and is done entirely online. As someone who grew up in an era where opportunities for women were somewhat limited, I find it so inspiring to read these applications!

Each year, the number of French applicants is increasing. Unfortunately, the committee has lost two bilingual members who, like me, could evaluate applications in both official languages. If you understand written French and would be interested in reading and evaluating exceptional Masters and PhD applications, please contact me at your earliest convenience. LOOKING BACK TO LOOK FORWARD

Stories from the Archives

What types of fundraising did our first members of the MLUWC do for the Scholarship Fund? In 1958, aside from assigning \$1 for the Fund from the \$6 yearly membership fee, small scale fundraising began right away. Playing card game parties were held regularly and raised considerable funds. On a smaller scale, the sale of hasti/hastynotes were first mentioned in 1959-60 from our past president, archivist, and named scholarship Alberta Shearer. The hasti-notes were sold to benefit the Scholarship Fund.

The first note cards were a wood block print by Mr. RJ Cornish of "A Habitant House,



for the Scholarship Fund.

Pointe Claire." Mr. Cornish oversaw the print shop at MacDonald College where the club's first newsletters were printed. The second card showed Stewart Hall where forty years of MLUWC's meetings were held.

Our first scholarship recipient in 1958, Miss Joan Ann Copeman, majoring in Chemistry (Faculty of Science) at the Royal Victoria College, McGill University received \$100. Ellen Anne Purdie our 1959 scholarship recipient received a \$200 grant. In 1960 \$368 was realized from a Scholarship Card Party at the John Rennie High School which allowed the club to be able to grant two scholarships for university entrance-one of \$300 and another of \$200. For many years the card parties were significant fundraisers

Join us Thursday October 5th at noon for a Zoom meeting to find out more about efforts to defend English education rights in Quebec.

Recent legislation enacted by the Legault government directly impacts the anglophone community's ability to manage its school system. Bill 40 seeks to abolish elected English school boards in favour of regional service centres. Bill 21 outlaws the wearing of religious symbols by certain government sector employees, including teachers, and affects the ability of English school boards to staff their classrooms as they see fit. Bill 96 caps enrollment at English language CEGEPs and imposes new French language courses on students.

Longtime education sector volunteers Rosemary Murphy and Leah Trineer, along with Andrew Cadell of the Task Force on Linguistic Policy will update MCW members on efforts to challenge these laws.

Remembering Mahsa Amini: Her Impact on Women's Rights in Iran and the World

Mahsa Amini was not a political activist. She was a 22-year-old Kurdish Iranian woman who was arrested by the Guidance Patrol for allegedly violating Iran's mandatory hijab law by wearing her hijab "improperly" while visiting Tehran from her hometown. Her death in police custody on September 16, 2022, sparked protests and civil unrest in Iran and around the world and the birth of the *Women Life Freedom* movement.

On the anniversary of her death, we are reminded of the ongoing struggles for women's rights in Iran and elsewhere. Since her death, the women's rights movement in Iran has continued to evolve and resist despite the government's brutal clampdown on protests. Women's rights activists have continued to speak out and demand change, inspiring others to join the movement.

Iranian women's rights groups seek support from international women's organizations in:

Advocating for the expansion of rights for women and all Iranians, including the right to freedom of expression, association, and assembly.

Calling for the repeal of discriminatory laws, such as the mandatory hijab law, and for the release of women's rights activists who have been arrested and imprisoned for peacefully protesting.

Urging international organizations to pressure the Iranian government to respect the rights of women and minorities and to hold those responsible for human rights abuses accountable.

Requesting the establishment of an independent commission to investigate the government's repression of women's rights activists.

Asking international organizations to provide support and resources to women's rights activists on the ground in Iran.

International women's organizations have played a central role in supporting the protests, condemning the government crackdown and advocating for the expansion of rights for women and all Iranians. The Montreal Council of Women continue to support the women of Iran in their struggle and stand in solidarity with them. We also remember with sorrow the lives that have been sacrificed.

Mahsa Amini is more than a symbol, she is a woman, a daughter, a friend - a life that was taken too soon.
