Dear Montreal Lakeshore University Women's Club, Object: CARE Jeunesse Gift Card Update August 26, 2022

Thank you for your generous donation last Christmas to our emergency gift card program! As you may know by now from past years of partnership with CARE Jeunesse, an estimated 2000 youth 'age out' of Quebec youth protection placements at age 18 annually many of whom do so with little to no adult support. Faced with housing insecurity, poverty, isolation and untreated past trauma, as many as 33% experience a period of homelessness before their 21st birthday. CARE Jeunesse was founded in 2015 by alumni of care to provide a community and a voice for fellow youth leaving placements in our province so that no one should have to experience this transition to adult life on their own.

Thanks to devoted partners like you, we were able to provide \$3085 in emergency gift cards to our members and their children last year, representing an 18% increase. For those struggling to make ends meet, this is a significant source of financial support and encouragement in a time of need. And our care does not stop there! Thanks to our gift card program, we are able to use this opportunity to connect youth to other community resources such as scholarships, job hunting services, legal assistance and more. For many, it is also an opportunity to connect with our team and get plugged into our peer support network where they can form positive, multi-generational friendships.

MOTION TO BE VOTED ON AT OCTOBER GENERAL MEETING

FRENCH LANGUAGE VERSION OF THE MONTREAL LAKESHORE UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S CLUB SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The following motion is proposed by the MLUWC Scholarship Fund Committee and was approved by the MLUWC Executive.

The general membership will be asked to vote on this motion at the next General Meeting on November 14, 2022.

BACKGROUND:

For many years the Scholarship Fund received financial assistance from local MNA's discretionary funds. However, the CAQ government added the requirement that only organizations with a Quebec Enterprise Number (NEQ) are eligible to receive government funding. Additionally, in order to register for an NEQ, an organization must have a French name. The French version will not replace the English name of our organization. The proposed name uses the same format as used by other University Women's Clubs in Quebec. Once the name is approved, Scholarship Fund can complete the NEQ registration process and be able to solicit funding from provincial government sources.

MOTION:

To adopt *Fonds de bourses d'études de l'association des femmes diplômées des universités – Ouest-de-l'Île* as the French language version of Montreal Lakeshore University Women's Club Scholarship Fund.

Driving down the 401,

What were three Past-Presidents of MLUWC doing on Highway 401 last month? Why, driving in Renate's car to see some plays in Stratford, ON!

For many years, MLUWC has organized a week-long bus trip to the Stratford Festival for club members and friends until Covid 19 turned out the lights in the theatres. This year, with the easing of restrictions, we again made the offer of a trip to those on the database from previous years, but most people were justifiably cautious about sitting in a theatre. As the pandemic news from Ontario improved, **Renate Sutherland, B J Bell and Kate Le Maistre** decided to scratch the theatrical itch, take all possible precautions, and make the journey.

We chose six plays from the ten on offer, and, as usual, the production values and standard of acting made it impossible to choose the best, or, even a favourite. In the Festival Theatre, we saw

Colm Feore in a modernized version of <u>"The Miser,"</u> with references to Mont Tremblant and Westmount, a spectacularly energetic "Chicago," choregraphed and directed by Donna Feore, and <u>"Hamlet,"</u> starring a remarkable young black woman, Amaka Umeh.

Amaka also starred as The Praise Singer in <u>"Death and the King's Horseman,"</u> a play that taught us a lot about colonial Nigeria in the 1940s and showed off Amaka's amazing singing and dancing skills. We also saw <u>"All's Well That Ends Well,"</u> not familiar to any of us, as well as "<u>Richard III,"</u> with Colm Feore limping in what looked like a most uncomfortable pose, and relishing the role of Shakespeare's evil king. Both these plays were performed under the tent in the first Stratford season in 1953 and were reprised this year to mark the opening of the new Tom Patterson Theatre. This venue replaces the old arena and is a Stratford star in its own right. It has the same thrust stage and steeply raked seating as the arena, but the seats are comfortable, the technology is world-class, and the whole building is an architectural beauty.

We stayed in **the Arden Park Best Western Hotel**, as usual, and although the hotel claimed to be understaffed, service was not badly affected, and our two breakfast waitresses were their usual welcoming and cheerful selves.

Should we plan a visit to the Festival next year? Definitely! Will we do so? If there is enough interest to fill a bus, and if some theatregoers are willing to help with the planning: yes. Otherwise, we'll still be making individual arrangements again. So far, the only confirmed productions for 2023 are the musicals <u>"Rent,"</u> based on <u>La Bohème,</u> and <u>"Spamalot,"</u> beloved by Monty Python fans. As soon as the playlist is known, we will canvass the membership to see if there is any interest in travelling and in helping to organize another delightful week.
