In honour of International Women's Day, Cinthya Leva Mancilla, owner and manager of Les Jardins Tierra Viva in Mirabel will speak about the rewards and challenges of community-scale farming.



BIOGRAPHY

Cinthya Leyva Mancilla is the owner and manager of Les Jardins Tierra Viva, an ecological community-scale farm located in Mirabel. She is originally from Mexico and holds a Bachelor's degree in Agriculture and Environmental Sciences as well as Master's in Plant Science from McGill University.

Cinthya did not come from a farming background but has always been fascinated with nature and loves cooking. She credits a 2009 internship at the organic farm Croques-Saisons in Lingwick, QC with sparking her inner passion for farming.

In 2014 she started Les Jardins Tierra Viva on leased land in Saint-Jacques-le-Mineur. For four years Cinthya worked the farm mostly on her own, growing her team as the farm grew. In 2018 she purchased 8 acres of land in Mirabel where the farm now produces a variety of fruits and vegetables as well as fresh eggs. Tierra Viva sells its products directly to consumers from June to October at the Saturday morning Valois market as well as through online sales.

Bill 96: An Official Opposition Amendment Guarantees the English-Speaking Community Access to Health Care Services in Their Language

QUEBEC CITY, February 3, 2022. —The right for each English-speaking person to obtain health care and social services in their own language will be strengthened from now on thanks to the relentless work carried out by the following Official Opposition critics: Protection of the French Language, Ms. Hélène David, Relations with English-Speaking Quebecers, Mr. David Birnbaum and Justice, Mr. Gaétan Barrette.

Indeed, during the detailed study of Bill 96, An Act respecting French, the official and common language of Quebec, the Official Opposition tabled and adopted an important amendment guaranteeing the English-speaking community the right to obtain health care and social services in English.

"The amendment that we proposed clearly demonstrated that for our political party, it is possible to protect our French language without threatening the rights of the Quebec's English-speaking community."

Dear members of the Montreal Lakeshore University Women's Club,

As promised and as announced, here is the challenge being presented to us & to you by the Quebec Council Advocacy committee as a fun but also informative exercise to help us become more aware of our ecological footprint. The Ecological Footprint is the only metric that measures how much nature we have and how much nature we use.

All 6 Quebec clubs will be taking part and we thought that a friendly competition might encourage you all to participate. We will count and compare the number of respondents in each club, and the club with the highest participation will be honored.

To complete the questionnaire, please click on https://www.footprintcalculator.org/ and answer the questions using the criteria below:

- You may choose the language of your choice.
- Base your answers on your consumption/situation from March 1st 2021, to February 28th 2022. FYI, the exercise can be repeated if you wish.
- Some frames contain a link below the text that states **Add details to improve accuracy**. Adding more detail paints a better picture.
- When you give the size of your home, do not include the basement. If you have more than one home, you should add the appropriate square footage.
- If you buy carbon credits or trees to offset your footprint, you may take that into consideration.
- The time of completion is estimated at 15 minutes.

Once you have completed your ecological footprint calculation, note your score (the number of earths required to support your lifestyle). Then click on https://forms.gle/R4oeGi2bJvXGee9CA and enter your score. This process will ensure the confidentiality of your results.

We will announce the winning club (with the most participation) and the average number of planet earths the group requires to support its lifestyles, at the April 23rd Quebec Council of CFUW meeting and through your club channels of communication.

The deadline to reply is April 21st.

The United Nations (UN) Commission on the Status of Women is the principle global intergovernmental body dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women. This year's diverse mix of styles and voices includes shows like *CHORALISSIMO!* highlighting two superb choirs—<u>Le Chœur de chambre du Québec</u> directed by Robert Ingari and L'Ensemble Phoebus men's choir directed by Roseline Blain; the *Grand Concert* featuring mezzo-soprano Florence Bourget with harpist Valérie Milot, and <u>Sainte-Anne Singers</u> & <u>Philomela Singers</u> directed by Margo Keenan; Oliver Forest and the authentic spiritual music of <u>Imani Gospel Singers</u>; *They Sing Everything!* with energetic, emerging talents singing Broadway, opera and pop; a show dedicated to seniors—*Dark Divas* by acclaimed vocalist, actor, songwriter <u>Ranee Lee</u> sharing songs from the great voices of the African American vocal tradition including Billie Holiday, Sarah Vaughan and Ella Fitzgerald; <u>Steel Rail</u> playing their special blend of 'folkgrass' music; and the *Concert Vox Aeterna* featuring soprano Frédéricka Petit-Homme and Montreal's first culturally diverse symphony orchestra, <u>Ensemble Obiora</u>, bringing a new voice to classical music in Canada. The festival also offers school concerts, an invaluable way to encourage children to engage with live performance. This year it's the musical ensemble of Les Fusiliers Mont-Royal.

Kutz acknowledges how important it is to have so many culturally diverse singers and instrumentalists performing the music of such a wide variety of composers and world-renowned artists, "We are addressing a vital need to see diversity on stage. Ensemble Obiora, Ranee Lee, Imani Gospel Singers and our workshop clinician Dr. Claudel Callender are examples of the presence of the high calibre of black musicians in our community."

From Brandyn Lewis, artistic director of Ensemble Obiora, "We are thrilled to be making our first appearance at **Festival de la Voix** which always features such talented artists. This concert will provide an opportunity for us to expand our repertoire to include music for voice, and to program unfamiliar works by composers of colour whose contributions have gone unnoticed."

Robert Ingari is the director of Le Choeur de chambre du Québec, part of this year's *CHORALISSIMO!* concert, "The 17 members of the choir and pianist Carmen Picard are delighted to finally be able to share the stage together and impart our love for new music composed to beautiful French texts. Our evocative program, rich in colour and harmony, will showcase the talents of all our members, some of whom will also play an instrument on stage. Long live singing and long live **Festival de la Voix!**" he declared.

Outstanding workshops on offer this year are Breath and the Basics of Good Singing with <u>Dr. Claudel Callender</u> focusing on alignment, breath, vowels, phrasing and falsetto; Acting and Physicalizing Text with Centaur Theatre Artistic Director, <u>Eda Holmes</u> concentrating on portraying the lyrics in the song by exploring mental and physical flexibility, spontaneity, and the many emotions evoked; Songwriting with JUNO Award-winner <u>Connie Kaldor</u>, touching on the main elements of rhythm, melody and lyrics, and culminating with a new song; and Advanced Choral Techniques with choir master <u>Philippe Bourque</u> working on tone production, phrasing and performance practices for a number of chosen pieces. Workshop scholarships are available upon request to those in need, particularly teenagers and young adults who don't have the opportunity to study privately.

Festival de la Voix is unique—including <u>concerts</u> and <u>workshops</u> for people of all ages, from grade school to senior citizens. The festival's mandate is to bring various communities together to celebrate music and the coming of spring.
